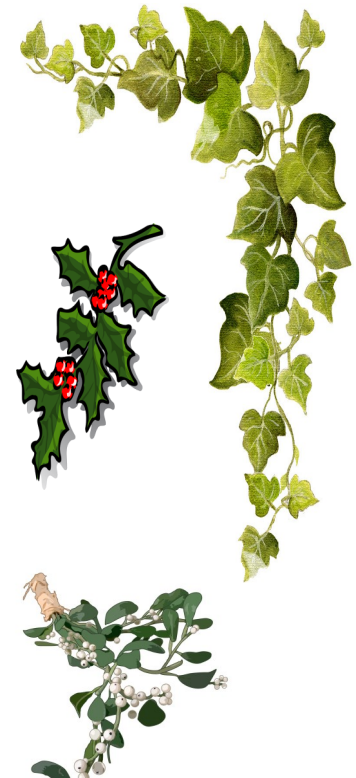
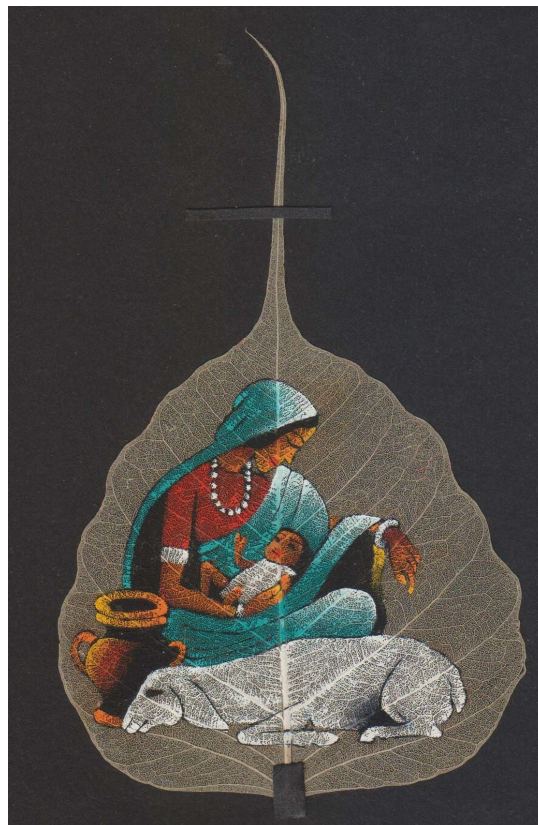

Unfortunately weather conditions and travel restrictions put a check on the number of members able to attend, nevertheless about 20 of us managed to get together and share.

Puzzles however remained the topic of the day ably presented to us by Hilary Hartigan using her iPad and the big screen. One of the events involved each of us submitting beforehand a photograph of ourselves under the age of 6 years. It was then up to the others to try and identify who it was. What's on in the Society? whilst celebrations over the Christmas period occupy most of us each of the Branches continues to prepare for the events of the year ahead.

Bolton: on Wednesday, 10th January, Bolton Branch kick off the new year with a speaker who narrates how their grandmother's uncle and wife, both cotton workers, went to work in a Russian cotton mill in 1861 only to find any number of British people already working in Russia. This is a hybrid meeting and full details of venue and how to register are available on the Branch web site.

Oldham: on Saturday, 13th January, Oldham Branch also develop the Cotton Industry theme with a presentation by Dr Michael Winstanley who is looking at "Life and Work in Cotton Lancashire 1830-1914". Scottish Indexes Conference: January 13th 2024

A little reminder that the 23rd Scottish Indexes Conference is now open for registration. It is to be held on Saturday, 13th January 2024 and information about it can be found [here](#) with an indication of those taking part.

Scotlands People: those of you who are registered to receive the ScotlandsPeople newsletter will be already aware of the latest additions to the site so this is for the benefit of those readers not so linked in. New employment records have been added to the "People Search" option. Click on the "Employment Records" box to see;

Lighthouse keepers registers: Search the registers of lightkeepers employed by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses (Northern Lighthouse Board) between 1837 and 1921. The lightkeeper registers have two parts. The first part consists of individual pages for each lightkeeper. The second part consists of individual pages for each lighthouse, which lists all lightkeepers who served at each lighthouse. Choose the relevant selection below to search by either individual lightkeeper, or by individual lighthouse.



Scottish Women's Land Army Register: These records refer to women who were engaged in agricultural and forestry work during the 2nd World War and cover the period 1939 to 1950. A chance then to find out if any female ancestor is listed and what they did during the war. Worth noting though that the information available only refers to those born in 1922 and before. Presumably, as with BMD records, other names will become available in future years as the 100 year rule progresses.

Scottish Records Association: you may recall that in the November newsletter I referred to the forthcoming conference organised by the Scottish Records Association, of which, we as a Branch, are members. It was held on the 23rd November in Perth. From the agenda produced it looked to be a very interesting gathering, unfortunately, not for those of us not geographically close to Perth. Given the predominance of Zoom facilities these days I emailed the secretary of the SRA to ask if consideration had been given to a Zoom facility at the conference for members not able to attend. This seemed particularly apt given that the AGM of the SRA is a Zoomed meeting. I received a very gracious reply to my email thus;

"Thanks for your email. Some of the SRA events are online only, some are on-site only and some are hybrid. I know that the conference working group considered a hybrid conference this year but decided to go with on-site only this time, but I don't know what the circumstances were. I think there might have been some issues with running a hybrid conference from the venue in Perth in the past (although that was due to different recording settings used by speakers when they recorded oral history interviews). We're certainly looking at conferences that will be online or hybrid in the future, and we run online palaeography workshops."

So, there we are. Perhaps something in the future. However for anyone interested in attend the AGM, it is a Zoom meeting and to be held on Thursday, 14th December at 12.30 p.m. The agenda and papers for the meeting are contained in the Autumn issue of the SRA journal, "Retour" which is available to Branch members in the "Exchange Journal" section of the Society web site under the heading of "Scottish Records Association". If you wish to attend, please notify the Secretary, Anne Cameron (anne.m.cameron@strath.ac.uk), no later than Tuesday 12 December to receive the Zoom joining instructions.

Scotland and the American Declaration of Independence: according to my sources it is thought that of the 56 signatories to the American Declaration of Independence, as many as 21, or even more, had Scottish ancestors. Two, John Witherspoon and James Wilson, were born in Scotland. Of the others, Thomas Jefferson, Thomas McKean, Francis Lewis, Phillip Livingston, George Ross and Benjamin Rush were all descended from Scots. Certainly it has long been considered that the principles behind the "*Declaration of Arbroath*" informed the thinking behind the American declaration. Are we surprised? No, not really.

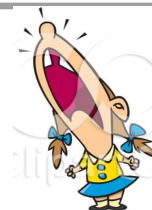

Anglo Scottish Branch Meeting - 1400 hrs on Saturday, 3rd February 2024 - by Zoom

“Caledonian Asylum Petitions” with Lorna Kinnaird.

Lorna is a professional genealogist living in Edinburgh who has been involved in Scottish family history research for many years. It was during part of her research that she came across the records she will be presenting.

The background to the petitions is the work of The Highland Society of London a charitable trust that has been going since 1778. In 1808 they appealed to raise funds for an “asylum” (a place of refuge) “to house the many young Scots roaming the streets of London, many having been orphaned or left fatherless following the Napoleonic wars.” It is the records of these that Lorna will be sharing with us .

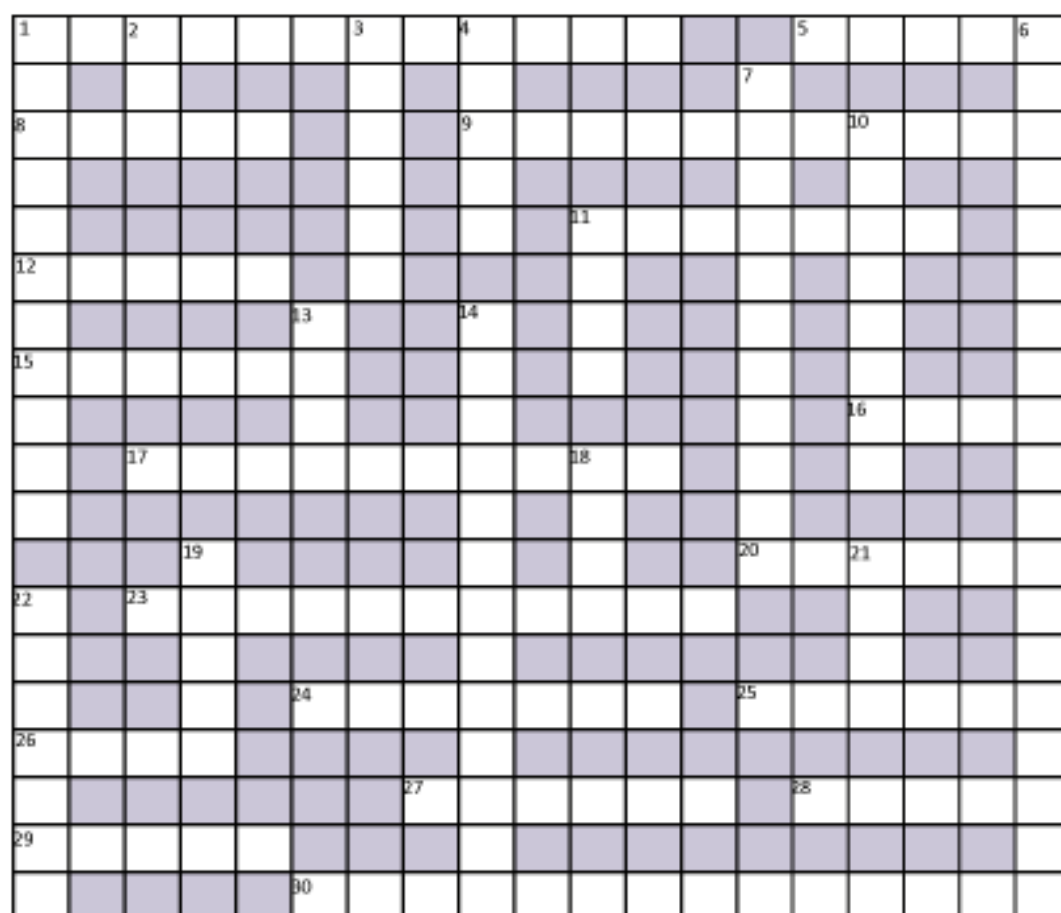


It promises to be a very interesting session about a topic few of us probably knew anything about. Lorna will be speaking to us from Edinburgh, so the presentation will be by Zoom.
