Photocopies of civil entries can be ordered for 5 euros which is much cheaper than ordering a certificate for 20 euros! But very few that are not available now.

Certificates for Northern Ireland cost £15 records can be searched and ordered online using pre purchased credits for a cost of £2:50

The Public Record Office of Northern Ireland has a huge digitization programme. Some early wills available to view. You can search the wills at **PRONI Will Calendars - Search** many original wills can be viewed **here for free.**

<u>Proni Valuation Books</u> you can search the valuation books by townland at https://apps.proni.gov.uk the books were used after Griffith and names were changed as land and properties changed hands. They range from 1864 to 1929. The names were crossed out and new owner's name put above. Date this happened put in same coloured pen on right hand side of page. This is free to view. This can sometimes help you pinpoint a year of death.

The valuation books for Ireland are being scanned at the moment and will go online when they have completed all the counties.

<u>Catholic parish records</u> https://registers.nli.ie/ The main obstacle is that the images have been released without an index, so you need to have a good idea of which parishes to research to have any chance of finding your family. However, since the images went online, the NLI's collection has been indexed by both Ancestry (fee) and Find My Past (free). So far, so good. But some researchers will be disappointed by the availability of surviving records. While the cut-off date for all the records is 1880/1, the start date depends on when the parish started keeping records and how well they were stored. Some start from the 1740s, others start 100+ years later. These registers are free to search on Find My Past.

If planning a trip to Dublin it is worth visiting this library in Kildare Street as they have a Genealogy advisory service which can be very useful.
