EDITOR'S COMMENTS

Hello and welcome to the 24th edition of the Manchester newsletter. Two years ago saw the beginning of a nationwide shutdown due to the Covid 19 virus but now all restrictions have been lifted in England. This has meant that an event planned for 2021 was finally a reality and was held on Saturday 26th March with family history societies and community groups meeting in the performance suite at Manchester Central Library.

We also had support from the library's sound and film Archives departments (Archives+). Thank you to David Govier and his team for organising an opportunity to visit the sound studio and learn how they are digitising thousands of tapes (both cassette and reel to reel) and using equipment that is no longer commercially available. When tape heads wear out or equipment fails then the only way forward is to buy second hand and strip out the usable components. It was also startling to discover that recordable CDs and DVDs have a very limited life span. If you have used these formats to archive your precious photographs or other memories then it was recommended that you back them up immediately to a hard drive or to the cloud. But remember, hard drives can, and do, fail. David also organised a film show of a selection of silent films (from 1910 to the mid 1920s) which ran continuously throughout the event.

I managed to visit all the stalls and everyone said that it was good to return to face-to-face events and have the opportunity to talk to friends and the general public. Thank you to all who attended the event and in particular to all the Society volunteers who gave up their time to help man our stall and to meet and greet the general public.

Pat Etchells, editor of our quarterly journal The Manchester Genealogist, has been in touch to say that she is would like to hear from members about their research. If you have a story to tell about your ancestors and the way they lived then please get in touch with Pat at <u>editor@MLFHS.org.uk</u>. Perhaps our overseas members have interesting stories about how their ancestors emigrated from the UK to start a new life. I am sure that it would be of interest to everyone particularly if you could say what websites and other sources were used to trace their movements. The article can be of any length and guidance can be found in any issue of the Manchester Genealogist under the heading of 'Notes for Contributors'.



PROJECTS UPDATE

The following update has been posted to **Manchester Burials** Added the final register for Pendlebury, St. John's Church courtesy of Mark Harrey. These are 489 burials 1940-45. Single volume of burials for Sacred Trinity, Salford, now in progress.

The following update has been posted to **Manchester School for the Deaf Admissions** A further volume covering admissions 1889-1895 have been added to The Great Database.

The following update has been posted to **Miscellaneous Small Projects** Added 264 baptisms for Bolton, King's Hall Wesleyan Methodist Mission 1932-1958 transcribed by Joan Bridges for Bolton & District FHS

Added 402 baptisms at Walmsley Old Chapel, Dimple transcribed by Bolton & District FHS.

Added 278 names taken from the Little Bolton Poor Rate books transcribed by John Lippiat of Bolton & District FHS.

Added a further 548 deaths at Scutari Hospital during the Crimean War 1854-6 and reported in UK newspapers. Transcribed by Anthony Stephen. This completes this project with a total of 5,893 deaths recorded.

Added 47 Marriages for Blackburn RD comprising: Darwen, Congregational Church (Hollins Grove) (2005-2008) Blackburn, Ragged School (Bent St) (1976-2007) Blackburn, Elim Pentecostal Church (Park Rd) (1986-1998) Thanks to Tony Foster and his team for the above.

Another sheet added to the **Godfrey Map Index**. This time the sheet for Bardsley 1906, which has been indexed by Barry Birch.

A mostly rural area, but provides the locations of a number of farms as well as the street names.

I have just added a further 198 street/building references to the Godfrey Map Index. These relate to the sheet for Royton in 1932 and come thanks to the work of Paul Thomas. More on the way!

Indexing of several more sheets is in progress around the Oldham area, but if you have any of the sheets for areas south of Manchester or between Bolton and Oldham, there are opportunities to contribute to this increasingly useful index.





Through The Salford Borough Police Courts 1881. Stan Worthington. Cases extracted from Salford's three main newspapers from the year 1881 with the majority of reports coming from the Pendleton Reporter. The cases are listed in chronological order and appear as reported.


Some typical entries:

Saturday 19th February 1881 MISCELLANEOUS Moses Wilkinson, 6, Brewerton-street, Pendleton, Mechanic, drunk and disorderly in Chapel-street, Salford, fined 5s, or three days. –William Mcnunn, 26 Crowther-street, Salford, labourer, drunk in Liverpool-street, fined 5s, or three days.

Friday 1st April 1881 WIFE ASSAULT. David Butler, 6, Johnson-street, Salford, hawker, was charged with assaulting his wife,

Mary, on the 28th inst. –The case having been proved the prisoner was ordered to find one surety in £5 and himself in £10 to keep the peace for twelve months, or in default fourteen days' imprisonment.



Details of some 250 archives with references to may thousands of names recorded in the police force registers in Britain including details of police museums. A5, 44pp.

Members of the Irish Ancestry Branch of Manchester & Lancashire FHS have, by kind permission of the Diocese, transcribed details of the 52,664 baptisms recorded in the above registers.

The transcript provides full details as contained in the registers and is accompanied by a composite index to the 243,155 names of children, parents and godparents appearing in the entries. Scanned images of each register concerned are also included.

Unlocking our Sound Heritage

Thousands of cassettes, open reels, CDs and MiniDiscs are sitting in archives, museums, libraries and in people's homes all over the UK. All kinds of unique live music, radio and conversation are recorded on these tapes and discs. We've already lost many of the people captured on them. And the British Library estimates that we have fifteen years to preserve the sounds themselves.

That's why the British Library has received funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund to establish Unlocking Our Sound Heritage, an exciting new national project to save thousands sounds which are at risk of being lost forever.

Archives+ is the hub partner for the North West region, which covers Cheshire, Cumbria, Greater Manchester, Lancashire and Merseyside. We'll be digitising around 15,000 recordings on 5,000 cassettes, reels and optical discs held all over the region here at Manchester Central Library.
