# The Battle of the Somme Bill Mitchinson 12th March

Dr Bill Mitchinson is a lecturer with King's College, London at the Joint Services Command and Staff College, Shrivenham.

Bill's interesting talk dealt with the general opinions that the Somme created, the context of the battle, the tactics and finally a synopsis of resources for family historians.

Bill recommended Ian Beckett's "The Great War" as being the best overall view of World War One.

Over forty people attended.

#### Our next meeting will be on Saturday 9th April at 2.00pm.

The Lancashire Cotton Famine and how we survived the American Civil War

The speaker will be Sid Calderbank, chairman of the Lancashire Society and committee member of *The Edwin Waugh Dialect Society*, has been over 40 years researching, collecting and performing works in the Lancashire dialect. The founder, in 2008, of *National Dialect Day* and a very popular speaker at arts and literature festivals, has been invited to contribute to several BBC radio and television programmes including Flog It!, Countryfile and Great British Railway Journeys.

The talk describes the terrible hardships experienced by Lancashire's mill workers during the early 1860's. These were recorded in songs, stories and poems of the time and Sid Calderbank, brings this history to life through the "Songs of the People".

This meeting will be held in the Education Suite, Gallery Oldham. (nearest tram stop - Oldham Central).

#### **Local Volunteers win Award**

A team of volunteers at Oldham Local Studies and Archives, along with volunteers in other Greater Manchester Archives recently won a national award.

The award is the National Archive Volunteering Award, 2015 awarded by the Archives and Records Association for GM1914 which was a project which explored the impact of the Great War on local communities.

The award was presented at the 2015 Greater Manchester Archives and Local Studies Partnership (GMALSP) Volunteering Awards in Salford which recognised volunteer contributions across Greater Manchester Archives and Local Studies.

### Working as a volunteer at Oldham Archives and Local Studies

The volunteer group was started about 25 years ago to create surname indexes for the censuses of the Oldham area. Once that was finished we moved on to other indexing and transcribing, the aim being to help make the huge quantity of material held in Oldham Local Studies and Archives available to everyone. Some jobs are better than others. The Higson archive was interesting, it was possible to spend a whole afternoon looking at the contents of just one envelope and we unrolled some beautiful mill plans in another archive which had not seen the light of day for years. On the other hand, transcribing a Royton rate book seemed never ending because the handwriting was terrible but we hope all the work will help people find what they want from the archives.

For the last couple of years several of the volunteers have been researching the stories of Oldham people who were part of the World War One effort, not all of them serving soldiers. ## Children's Homes Website Mary Pendlebury has sent this information:

The website aims to provide information on all the many and varied institutions that became home for thousands of children and young people in Britain. They range from orphanages, homes for those in poverty, or with special needs, through to reformatories, industrial and approved schools, training ships, and hostels. As well as each home's location, history etc. the site includes many maps, census listings, and historic images of the buildings and their inmates.

#### **Irish Catholic Records**

Who Do You Think You Are magazine recently reported this in their online magazine:

A vast set of Catholic parish records from both Northern Ireland and the Irish Republic spanning almost 150 years can now be explored more easily on the web via **Ancestry** and **Findmypast**.

The databases on both sites feature records of around 10 million baptisms, marriages and burials that took place from the 17th century until 1880 across more than a thousand parishes. All of the entries can be searched by details including name, date and location, and are linked to high-quality images of the original registers.

The release is the most comprehensive set of such records yet made available online, and represents one of the most valuable resources for genealogists searching for Irish connections in the years before the 1901 census. The new databases include data from several counties, such as Wexford and Clare, not present in some other online collections.
