Crooks and Coffin Ships, Quarantine and Cholera
A talk by David Muil, MLFHS Chairman

Crooks & Coffin Ships, Quarantine & Cholera uses contemporary accounts to illustrate the perils and obstacles confronting the aspiring emigrant during the 19th century.

Though mass emigration from Britain to North America had taken place since the time of the Pilgrim Fathers, emigrant passengers were not protected under the law until the early 19th century and even then operators found ways to evade their obligations. And so the 3,000 mile voyage across the Atlantic aboard a flimsy vessel of about 500 tons or so threatened the migrant and his family in so may ways.

Speaker, David Muil, an experienced maritime and family history researcher explores these themes in an illustrated PowerPoint presentation.'

The official unveiling of a statue to The Oldham Suffragette, took place on the steps of the Old Town Hall, on a bitterly cold day, exactly 100 years to the day when some women were allowed to vote in a general election.



A large crowd of people gathered in the foyer of Gallery Oldham many dressed as Suffragettes.

Led by a band and with banners, we marched across Union Street and up to the Old Town Hall where the Mayor, Oldham MP Jim McMahon and members of the Kenney family watched with us as local school children pulled the cords to reveal Annie. Members of the public then laid flowers around the foot of the statue in acknowledgement of all that she did to help get women the vote.

John Marsden will discuss civil registration of births, marriages and deaths. The talk will examine the background to the introduction of civil registration and how the system operates. John will explain how to find an event using both online and offline indexes and examine the information provided by BMD certificates and where this might lead your research. Finally he will suggest ways you might save some money (or at least waste less!) by using online and offline resources to improve your searches or even avoid the need to buy a certificate at all.

Visit to the People's History Museum- Guided tour of the Peterloo Exhibition- Disrupt? Peterloo and Protest.

This exhibition forms a central part of the People's History Museum bicentenary programme. The nature of Peterloo and the political repression that followed means there are few artefacts remaining, which in bringing together for the first time key items from the time makes this exhibition all the more powerful. This includes a **Peterloo medal**, the only one of its kind uncovered to date, which carries the strong and impassioned words of the time, "These things will not endure or be endured". A newly commissioned film will feature as part of the exhibition, telling the story of Peterloo and the road to democratic reform.

Alongside the exhibition a gallery will become a **Protest Lab**, for individuals, communities and organisations to use as an experimental space for creative campaigning and collective action.

MLFHS will have a guided tour of the exhibition for about an hour. You can then get something to eat in the cafe and go on a self-guided tour of the other galleries if you wish.
